There are two formulas for calculating bonding capacity.

District taxable value x 50% or if the district mill value per ANB is less than the facility guaranteed mill value then facility statewide mill value per ANB (\$32.17 Elementary), (\$72.21 High School) x 1000 x ANB (Enrollment) x 50%

K-12 district formula is 100% of Taxable Value or the sum of facility statewide mill values and then use above formula.

They are also obligated for Bozeman High School debt until paid in full.
